

- (g) assess the relevance of information to a particular problem or topic;
- (h) examine historical data and draw reasoned conclusions;
- (i) make inferences from historical evidence.

(b) Enquiry and Communication

- (a) read and comprehend primary and secondary sources;
- (b) read maps, diagrams, charts and graphs;
- (c) interview resource persons;
- (d) classify and order data;
- (e) use indices and reference books;
- (f) record data in various ways;
- (g) investigate historical sites;
- (h) present historical data and argument in different forms by using, for example, short and

extended essays, graphs, diagrams, statistics, discussions and oral presentations, audio and video tapes.
